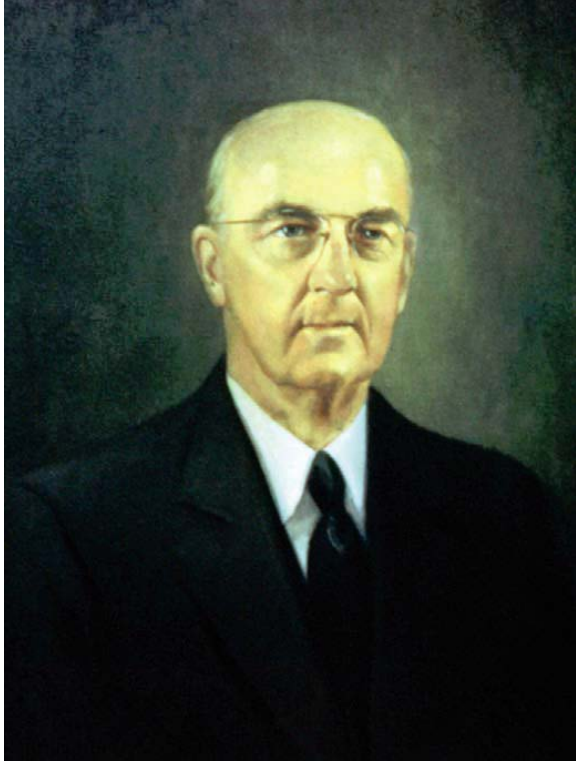




**BARKER, SETH S. 1888-1968**

Bachelor of Accounting Degree from Southern Iowa Normal. Founder and President of the Barker Poultry Equipment Company for 36 years. He gained worldwide recognition for the poultry equipment he developed and manufactured, especially equipment for processing poultry and eggs. He served as president of the Iowa Development Commission, President of the Iowa Manufacturers' Association, President of Rotary, President of Ottumwa, Iowa, Community Chest, President of the Ottumwa Chamber of Commerce, trustee of Iowa Wesleyan College and was active in many other civic affairs. Poultry Hall of Fame, 1953.



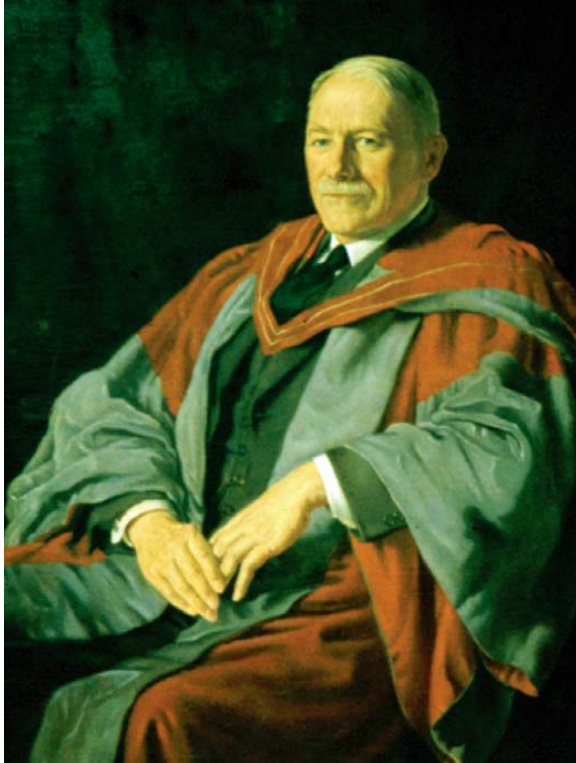
**WAMPLER, CHARLES W. 1885-1976**

County Agriculture Agent in Virginia, 1910-1927. Organized the Wampler Feed and Seed Company in 1927. Served with Virginia State Board of Agriculture, 1937-1954. Started artificial incubation and brooding of turkeys in 1922. A founder and first president of National Turkey Federation (1939-1945). President First National Bank of Harrisonburg Virginia. 1935-1960. General supervisor of eight farms and hatcheries until 1968. Member of the Regency for Bridgewater College. Honorary life member of National Turkey Federation, Virginia State Poultry Federation and Cheviot Sheep Association. Poultry Hall of Fame, 1953.



**KILBOURNE, L. B. 1862-1940.**

A prominent Chicago businessman who was a leader in processing, marketing and refrigeration of poultry and eggs. He served as a partner in the C. H. Weaver and Company, Chicago, President of Central Cold Storage, Chicago, Omaha Cold Storage and De Soto Creameries and Produce Company, Minneapolis. He was a founder and generous supporter of the Institute of American Poultry Industries. He served as a member of the U. S. delegation to the World's Poultry Congress held in Leipzig, Germany in 1936 that invited the Congress to be held in the U. S. in 1939. Two hundred friends gave Mr. Kilbourne a testimonial dinner at the Poultry Products Conference held at the University of Chicago in 1935. These friends presented \$1000 to the Institute's Research Fund as a tribute to Mr. Kilbourne's interest in research for the improvement of the poultry industry. Poultry Hall of Fame, 1953.



**GRAHAM, PROFESSOR W. R. 1875- 1958**

B. S. A., Ontario Agricultural College, 1894. In charge of poultry husbandry at Ontario Agricultural College, 1899-1940 and professor of poultry husbandry, 1908-1940. A teacher and philosopher who taught students to think. Developed a utility type Barred Plymouth Rock which became world famous. As a poultry judge and speaker he was in great demand in Canada and the U. S. He was a founder and first president of the Poultry Science Association, 1908-1909, 1918-1919, Fellow in 1933. He also helped organize the World's Poultry Science Association in 1912. Doctor of Science, University of Toronto, 1938. Graham Hall at OAC honors his memory. In Canada's Centennial Year, 1967, the Ontario Poultry Council gave him posthumously its Award of Merit and named him "Canada's Poultryman of the Century." Poultry Hall of Fame, 1953.



**RICE, PROFESSOR JAMES E. 1865-1953**

B.S. Cornell, 1890. Farmed for 11 years. Cornell, Assistant Professor of Poultry Husbandry, 1903-1907; Professor and Head of Department, 1907-1934. First professor of poultry husbandry in the U. S. "Jimmie" was an enthusiastic teacher, speaker and leader who inspired all who knew him. He organized the first poultry judging school (1918) and was first to start poultry extension work. He was a founder and first secretary-treasurer of the Poultry Science Association and president, 1910-1911. President of the World's Poultry Science Association, 1939-1948. General Chairman of the World's Poultry Congress held in Cleveland in 1939. Rice Hall and the Rice Memorial Library at Cornell commemorate his memory. Poultry Hall of Fame, 1953.
