B.S., 1914, and Ph.D. 1922 - Cornell University. Instructor, University of Connecticut, 1914-1919; Instructor, Cornell University, 1919-1922; Head of Poultry Division, University of Illinois, 1922-1947; Head of Animal Science Department, University of Illinois, 1947-1957; Group leader, Illinois ICA contract with India, 1957-1959. Professor Emeritus, Illinois, 1960. An outstanding teacher, author of widely used poultry textbooks and many scientific articles and research investigator in poultry breeding, physiology and egg formation. U.S. delegate to the Third and Fourth World's Poultry Congress. IPIA Award for distinguished service to the Poultry Industry of Illinois, 1947. President Poultry Science Association, 1926-1927, Editor of Poultry Science 1922-1931, and Fellow, 1940. Poultry Hall of Fame; 1968.



CARPENTER, CLIFF D. 1897-1965

D.V.M. Cornell, 1920 and M.S. University of Kansas, 1938. Private veterinary practice, 1923-1935. Industry veterinary practice 1935-44. President, Institute of American Poultry Industries, 1944-1958. He provided, during his career, pioneering and inspiring leadership to the rapidly growing and changing poultry industry. Distinguished Service Award of the Institute of American Poultry Industries. Honorary membership in the Mississippi Valley Veterinary Medical Association; National Turkey Federation, Texas Poultry and Egg Association and the Mexican Producers' Federation. U. S. delegate and chairman U.S. participation committee to the 9th, 11th and 12th World's Poultry Congress. Poultry Hall of Fame, 1968.



FUNK, DR. ERNEST M. 1899-

B.S., Southeast Missouri State College, 1926, M.S., University of Missouri, 1927 and Ph.D., University of Wisconsin, 1951. Professor of Poultry Husbandry, University of Missouri, 1930-1969. Administrator, educator, author and chairman of poultry department. Author or co-author of three poultry textbooks and numerous technical and popular articles on poultry. Pioneer investigator of hatchability and the preservation of quality in eggs and egg products. Developed the process of thermostabilization of shell eggs. U.S. member of the Council of the World's Poultry Science Association, 1948-1970. President, Poultry Science Association, 1951-1952, Research prize, 1942, PENB Christie Award, 1950. Honorary member of National and Missouri Turkey Federation. Poultry Hall of Fame, 1968.



PAYNE, PROFESSOR LOYAL F. 1889- 1970

B.S. Oklahoma State College, 1912 and M.S. Kansas State College, 1925. Professor and Acting Head of the Poultry Department, University of Massachusetts, 1914-1921. Professor and Head of the Poultry Department, Kansas State, 1921-1954, Professor, 1954-1960 and Professor Emeritus, 1960-1970. Excellent teacher, dedicated researcher and effective administrator who contributed unselfishly to the industry. Original research on chick embryo mortality during incubation. Author of many scientific and popular articles. He was responsible for the translation of "Aldrovandi on Chickens". Helped organize and develop the American Poultry Historical Society and served as president. President, Poultry Science Association, 1925-1926, Fellow, 1941. Poultry Hall of Fame, 1968.



MARSDEN, STANLEY J. 1897-1971

B.S. Michigan State, 1921 and M.S. University of Nebraska, 1930. Instructor in poultry, University of Nebraska, 1921-1929. USDA Turkey Investigations, 1929-1965. Co-author of Turkey Management and author of numerous scientific and popular articles. A leader in developing the Beltsville Small White Turkey. On founding committee and first secretary of the National Turkey Federation and honorary life member. NTF Research Award in 1954 and Special Award for Outstanding Service in 1961. USDA Superior Service Award, 1951. Tilghman Memorial Trophy of the Maryland Turkey Growers Association in 1962. Poultry Science Fellow, 1962. Poultry Hall of Fame, 1968.



SALSBURY, DR. JOSEPH E. 1887-1967

Born in England. D.V.M. Kansas City Veterinary College, 1914. Practicing veterinarian, 1915-1923 in Nebraska and South Dakota. Founder, president and chairman of Salsbury Laboratories, Charles City, Iowa, 1923-1967. He perceived the need and developed dependable poultry health products. He provided service and education to help poultrymen solve their disease problems, emphasizing research and the use of efficacious drugs and biologics. Served as trustee of the Sioux Falls College, Sioux Falls, South Dakota. Honorary Doctor of Science, Sioux Falls College. Honorary member of National Turkey Federation and Boy Scouts of America. Service awards by 4-H and Rotary, Poultry Hall of Fame, 1968.
