



GWIN, JAMES M., 1906-1993

B.S. University of Connecticut, 1927, M.A. American University, 1941, Ph.D. Cornell, 1949. Born on a poultry farm Dr. Gwin effectively served every phase of the industry. He worked for government, industry capacities ranging institutions in investigation to teaching to product promotion to administration. His services to the industry included military procurement, grading standards, production coordination, marker analysis and the preservation of the industry's history. Jimmy, as he became affectionately known, was one of the world's foremost collectors of poultry literature and a charter member of APHS. Numerous awards in scientific and marketing circles including Marketing Man of the Year came to him. Poultry Hall of Fame, 1977.



JAAP, ROBERT GEORGE, 1905- 1992

University of Saskatchewan B.A., 1927, B.S.A. 1929; University of Wisconsin M.S., 1930, Ph.D. 1933. A native of Canada, Dr. Jaap became known worldwide for his work in poultry generics. His accomplishments were in the fields of growth rate and egg production inheritance, breeding methods, physiological genetics and the genetics of hormonal responses. A Fulbright Scholar, he received the Ralston Purina Teaching Award, French Medal of Honor, McDougal Award, President and Editor of Poultry Science Assn. and long-rime Treasurer and Editor of the WPSA. Poultry Hall of Fame, 1977.



POMEROY, BENJAMIN S., 1911-2004

D.V.M. Iowa State, 1933; M.S. Cornell, 1934; Ph.D. Minnesota, 1944. Dr. Ben Pomeroy combined a lifelong career of teaching and research in poultry pathology to create an enviable reputation as "The Authority" on turkey diseases. Ben Pomeroy served on countless advisory boards and scientific panels, and he frequently spoke for industry concerns. Many honors have been accorded him as he so enthusiastically championed the disease concerns of the turkey industry which include Fellow of Poultry Science Assn., honorary life member and award winner in National Turkey Federation, Veterinarian of the Year (1970), and Outstanding Educator of the Year (1973). SAGLIO, HENRY, 1911-2003

Henry Saglio, one of poultry's most foresighted leaders, was born of immigrant parents. He saw the industry's need for a fast growing white-feathered meat bird of superior conformation. Following successes in the Chicken of Tomorrow contests, Mr. Saglio systematically and rapidly became a prominent poultry breeder and a leader in the National Broiler Council. He is credited as being the individual most directly responsible for the direction taken by the broiler industry. Henry Saglio, a hard-working practical poultryman whose vision earned him worldwide respect and acclaim without sacrificing the common touch. Poultry Hall of Fame, 1977.



WILHELM, LEROY A., 1910-1974

Kansas State B.S. 1932, M.S. 1933; Purdue Ph.D. 1951. Dr. Wilhelm, · known as "Tiny", worked in industry, in universities, and in the field of promotion. "Tiny" Wilhelm understood people and he also knew the producers ' problems, the marketer's frustrations and the consumers' desires. This depth of understanding plus his energetic approach made him an effective coordinator and leader. Dr. Wilhelm was a member of Poultry Science Assn., American Poultry Historical Society, National Platform Speakers Assn., American Farm Economics Assn., National Turkey Federation and others. He joined Quaker Oars for 10 years. Until his retirement in 1974, he served as President and General Manager of P.E.N.B. Poultry Hall of Fame, 1977.
